Collection development and management is a process accomplished through strategic planning, assessing needs, analyzing collections, establishing collection policies and procedures, budgeting, selecting and deselecting resources, acquisitions, cooperating with other libraries and organizations, and evaluation.

Library collection development is the process of meeting the information needs of the people in a timely and economical manner using information resources locally held, as well as from other organizations. Collections are developed by Librarians and library staff by buying or otherwise acquiring materials over a period, based on assessment of the information needs of the library's users.
